BONUS:

Most of our gardens are popping up and need the weeds to be pulled. 20 min. of gardening helps move your bowels and cuts your risk of constipation in half if you do it daily. Now you can really justify all the weed pulling!

For those 4th of July BBQ stains, turn the garment inside out and blast with cold water to force the stain from back to front. Add a few drops of dishwashing liquid, gently working it in with your fingers, then rinse and throw in the wash. This also works well on pizza sauce.

Grass Stains: Chlorophyll in the plant/grass is what causes the stains, it attaches itself to the fibers like a permanent dye. Use rubbing alcohol, soak a sponge and saturate the spot. Blot until the green is gone, then wash.

Grease stains like from Burgers cover the area with a bit of baking soda. The chemical reaction, like the spot turning dark, as the baking soda absorbs the stain. Let it sit for a few minutes, then shake off any remaining powder and launder as usual.





HISTORY OF NATIONAL BLUEBERRY MONTH

Blueberries have been consumed for a very long time — more than 13,000 years, according to some reports — but the Native Americans were the first to recognize the versatility of this fruit. They used blueberries for medicinal purposes and as a natural flavoring agent.

The Native Americans were using wild blueberries, which have been around for an incredibly long time, but the ones we eat are different. The blueberries we get in the supermarket are the result of one person's long commitment to cultivating blueberries. Elizabeth White, the daughter of cranberry farmers in New Jersey, wanted to expand her family's business with other crops, particularly blueberries. While studying at Drexel University in Philadelphia, her main interest centered around figuring out how to grow the best blueberries. She eventually partnered with botanist Frederick Coville to cultivate blueberries at her farm. Before these efforts, blueberries could not be grown on any farm — the only way to have them fresh was to pick them in the wild. Now, blueberries are available in 35 U.S. states and some other regions around the world. British Columbia is the largest blueberry growing region in the world, with Canada coming in third behind the U.S. and Chile.

For many years, the National American Blueberry Council wanted to have July as National Blueberry Month. Eventually, the United States Department of Agriculture officially recognized this month, and it has been celebrated ever since.

A Partnership that Changes Everything

Elizabeth White and USDA botanist Frederick Coville become partners after she reads his publication, 'Experiments in Blueberries' — they work together on her family farm.

1912

First Blueberry Crops

Elizabeth White and Frederick Coville successfully grow blueberries on her farm.

1916

First Commercial Blueberry Crop Sold

Elizabeth White and Frederick Coville's team harvests and sells its first commercial crop of blueberries.

1930s

Blueberries Go to England

Highbush varieties of this fruit are introduced in Europe.

1932

Elizabeth White Gets Her Due

New Jersey awards Elizabeth White for her outstanding contributions to agriculture.

1942–1962

Blueberry Cultivation Spreads

Blueberry cultivation spreads around America, appearing in 13 U.S. states.



1. Logic Puzzle: There are two ducks in front of a duck, two ducks behind a duck and a duck in the middle. How many ducks are there?

Answer: Three. Two ducks are in front of the last duck; the first duck has two ducks behind; one duck is between the other two.

2. Logic Puzzle: Five people were eating apples. A finished before B, but behind C. D finished before E,

but behind B. What was the finishing order?

Answer: CABDE. Putting the first three in order, A finished in front of B but behind C, so CAB. Then, we know D finished before B, so CABD. We know E finished after D, so CAB-DE.

3. Logic Puzzle: Jack is looking at Anne. Anne is looking at George. Jack is married, George is not, and we don't know if Anne is married. Is a married person looking at an unmarried person?

Answer: Yes. If Anne is married, then she is married and looking at George, who is unmarried. If Anne is unmarried, then Jack, who is married, is looking at her. Either way, the statement is correct.

4. Logic Puzzle: A man has 53 socks in his drawer: 21 identical blue, 15 identical black and 17 identical red. The lights are out and he is completely in the dark. How many socks must he take out to make 100 percent certain he has at least one pair of black socks?

Answer: 40 socks. If he takes out 38 socks (adding the two biggest amounts, 21 and 17), although it is very unlikely, it is possible they could all be blue and red. To make 100 percent certain that he also has a pair of black socks he must take out a further two socks.

5. Logic Puzzle: The day before two days after the day before tomorrow is Saturday. What day is it today?

Answer: Friday. The "day before tomorrow" is today; "the day before two days after" is really one day after. So if "one day after today is Saturday," then it must be Friday.



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
